# Commercial Determinants of Health (CDOH) | CDOH Essentials | 29th April

Alice Wiseman (ADPH Vice President), spoke at the launch of a new <u>set of materials</u>, developed by public health registrar Anna Brook with Katherine Körner, May van Schalkwyk and Mark Petticrew, through the <u>London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine Commercial Determinants Research Group</u>. <u>CDOH Essentials</u> has been endorsed by ADPH as part of our <u>CDOH project</u> and is aimed at public health professionals to use to plan and run an introductory workshop or briefing session on CDOH for both public health teams and key internal partners within local authorities.

#### **ADPH gives evidence at Tobacco and Vapes Bill Committee**

# Walsall Council | Walsall partners commit to better mental health through the Prevention Concordat | 14<sup>th</sup> May

The Walsall Mental Wellbeing Partnership has reinforced its commitment to enhancing mental health support by signing the national Prevention Concordat for Better Mental Health. This work, led by Walsall Council's Public Health team, highlights a prevention-focused approach to mental health, aiming to create a fairer and more equitable borough. Key partners in this initiative include the NHS Black Country Healthcare Foundation Trust, NHS Black Country Integrated Care Board, and the Walsall Together partnership.

The partnership has already implemented steps to boost mental wellbeing through their ten-year multi-agency Mental Wellbeing Strategy, which emphasises prevention, early



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intervention, and building community mental health literacy. The multi-agency partnership has a diverse membership including housing, social care, and a range of community, and voluntary sector organisations from across Walsall. Together, they assess and address mental health needs, offering critical wider support for debt, employment, and housing issues, early.

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
